


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Rapid Call Volume Growth



Increasing call volumes, particularly for 9-1-1 calls, are making timely response and service a major challenge.






Increasing 9-1-1 Hold Times

Peel continues to address community needs with the lowest number of officers per 100,000 population for populations greater than 1 million.


Officers Per 100,000 Population

Critical Infrastructure Replacement



Substantial replacement required to support service delivery.

SIR ROBERT PEEL CENTRE/22 DIVISION (7750 Hurontario St, Brampton)

- Poor Condition
- Facility is 40 years old
- Critical infrastructure housed in facility is at risk
- Revitalization not feasible
- Replacement is a public safety need




Fiscal responsibility and innovative policing remain priorities, however conservative past budgets and realities of our region continue to present challenges.


