




Overview of the Project

Seniors are the fastest growing age group in Peel and across Canada and the Region of Peel aims to create an Age-Friendly Community.

The Region of Peel adopted Regional Official Plan Amendment (ROPA) 27 which includes policies related to planning communities, including public spaces and services, to best serve the aging population.

To do this, Peel Region has undertaken the **Age- Friendly Planning Built Environment Assessment Project**




Region of Peel, 2021

Diversity in Peel Region

- Almost half of seniors belong to a racialized group
- In 2016, 53% of the population was comprised of immigrants or non-permanent residents.
- The majority of the population is born outside of Canada
- Home to more established immigrants than recent immigrants

What is Age-Friendly Planning?

An **Age-Friendly Community** is a place that makes it easy for older adults (aged 65+) to

- stay active
- maintain physical and mental wellbeing
- stay connected to people that are important to them
- where services, facilities, and programs are more accessible and responsive to the specific needs of older adults

An age-friendly community enables people of all ages to be engaged and participate in community activities and treats everyone with respect, regardless of age.






Neighbourhoods


- Consulted with working groups;

- Based on local context (municipality, neighbourhood type, age of built form, proportion of seniors, income, potential for growth).






Outdoor Spaces and Buildings

- Are public toilets available?
- Enough lighting on public streets and parks?
- Do you use public parks near you?
- Are sidewalks accessible for pedestrians (e.g. wide enough)?
- Do you experience and perceive a sense of personal safety?
- Is the public realm pleasant and encouraging of walking?

Tell us about your experience. Some prompts:

- Do you feel connected to your community?
- Are essential health and social services
 (Service Ontario, places of worship, pharmacies, hospitals, etc.) available in your community and can they be reached a convenient mode of transportation?
- Are residential care facilities (retirement homes and nursing homes) located close to services and are they integrated with the larger community?

Transportation

Tell us about your experience. Some prompts:

- Are non-automobile forms of transportation (walking, cycling, transit, carpooling) accessible in your neighbourhood?
- Are you able to **easily access your destination** (e.g. community gatherings, errands, parks, etc.)
- Are transit stops near where you live? Where other seniors live?
- Do you feel **safe crossing intersections**? Is there enough time allocated to crossing, is there enough pedestrian infrastructure?

Housing

Tell us about your experience. Some prompts:

- Is there a **range of housing options**, including affordable housing, in your neighbourhood to meet the needs of older residents?
- Does your current home meet your needs as you age? E.g. Even surfaces, wide passages for wheelchairs, appropriately designed bathrooms and kitchens?
- What features do you value most in a home? E.g. accessibility, affordability, outdoor space, close to transit, close to shopping, etc.



Social Participation


Tell us about your experience. Some prompts:
